ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION



Administrative Synopsis:

The Administrative Division consists of 2 Chief Administrative Officers, 1 Technology Officer, 3 Administrative Assistants, 1 Social Media Manager, 1 Director of Professional Development and Wellness, 1 Program Director of Alternative Promotional Track

Mission of Administrative Division:

Our mission is to provide the highest quality of service and professionalism in servicing the needs of our employees as well as the community.

Administrative Functions:

- Retain and update all medical and personnel records
- Manage a retention program for all departmental information
- Oversee all phases of the hiring process
- Deliver payroll bi-weekly to all employees
- Manage health, dental, and vision insurance programs
- Administer all changes to payroll
- Manage leave balances for all employees
- Manage the ordering of supplies and uniforms



Administrative Review 2022:

We hired a Director of Professional Development and Wellness allowing our employees to access immediate assistance regarding wellness concerns. We have also outfitted a workout facility for our employees that may be accessed 24/7 to maintain physical readiness. With the great work of our professional standards committee as well as our program director for the alternative track, we have established an alternative path for promotion utilizing fire centric and leadership based courses and training. We have completed the updates for our class plans to include appropriate trainings and certifications to better qualify our employees to handle the rigors of their newly promoted positions.

Goals for 2023:

- Improve upon customer service and communication with all SGFD employees
- Implement new payroll system
- Recruit and hire necessary personnel to maintain adequate staffing
- Create more opportunities for employee development
- Develop and staff public education and community relations positions
- Create more opportunities for wellness activities

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION



Wellness Programming Update:

There are three areas of wellness we have targeted during the past year: mental fitness, physical fitness, and professional development.

Regarding mental fitness, we developed a network of mental health providers who (a) have completed additional training in working with first responders/firefighters or (b) specialize in an area pertinent to firefighters (e.g., trauma, substance use, marriage and family, and grief counseling). As of now, we have 10 mental health providers who have a signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with SGFD, in addition to our already present EAP.

For physical fitness, Firefighter/operators Nathan Boudreaux and Blake Thompson worked together to design and outfit our gym and have begun offering peer-fitness training sessions to SGFD members who would like to improve their fitness.

Finally, Alexandra Dodd, MSW, LMSW, came on board and spearheaded professional development, focusing on the administration of our in-house technical degree program and case management.

OPERATIONS DIVISION



The St. George Fire Protection District is a Fire Service-based organization that provides Emergency Medical Services (EMS). This requires all members to be cross-trained as firefighters and EMTs; because of a growing need in the community, we have also added paramedics and advanced EMTs to the ranks. This dual role maximizes the efficiency of personnel and resources. About 70% of the calls for service are responses to medical emergencies. In addition to providing Advanced Life Support (ALS) and Basic Life Support (BLS) services, the department responded to fires, rescue incidents, hazardous conditions, and all other emergency and non-emergency calls for service in 2022.



The Operations Division is the largest division of the fire district and is divided into three shifts: A, B, and C. This ensures round-the-clock service to the community. Each shift is supervised by an Assistant Chief with two Battalion Chiefs and one Safety Officer. The members assigned to each shift carry the ranks of Captain, Lieutenant, Paramedic, and Firefighter/Operator. There are approximately 50 members assigned to each shift for a total of 150 line personnel. The minimum daily staffing level is 39, working a 24-hour shift schedule. These are the individuals who staff the fire apparatus and medic response units, responding throughout the community to provide a timely response to requests for services.

The St. George Fire Protection District responded to a total of 12,579 calls for service in 2022 (3.87% decrease from 2021), with 7,269 of those being medical emergencies. The department responded to 311 fire calls (5.14% decrease from 2021), resulting in \$8.58 million in property loss (16% decrease from 2021) out of \$41.28 million in property value involved, resulting in an 82.6% property save rate.

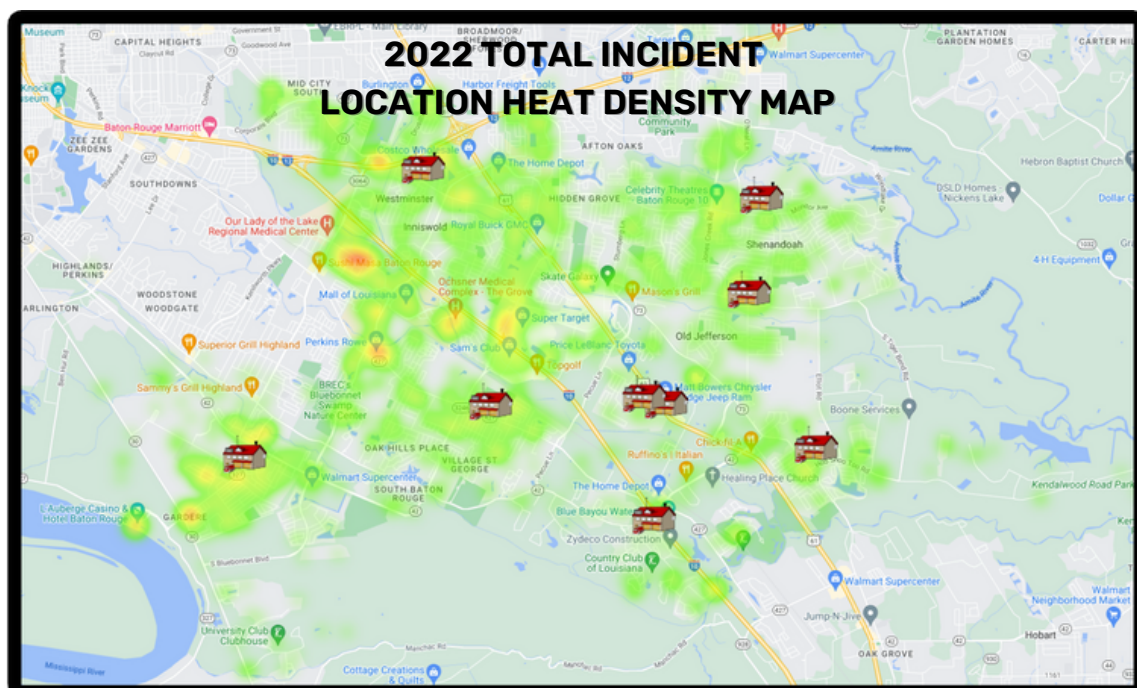
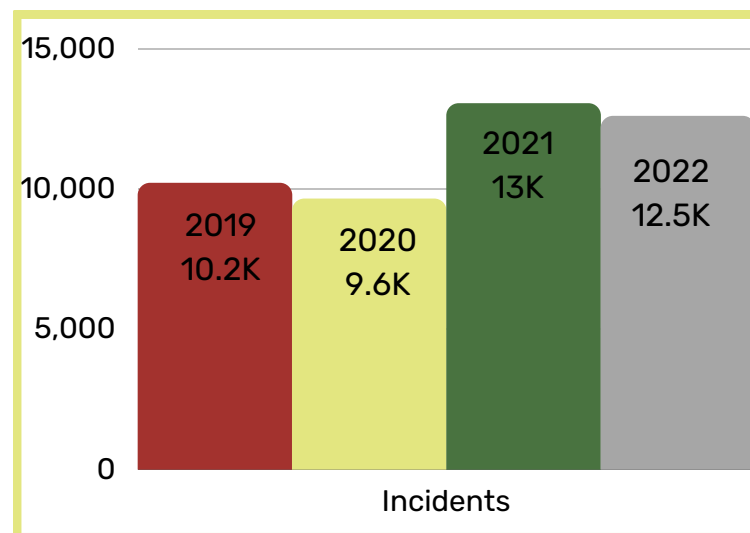

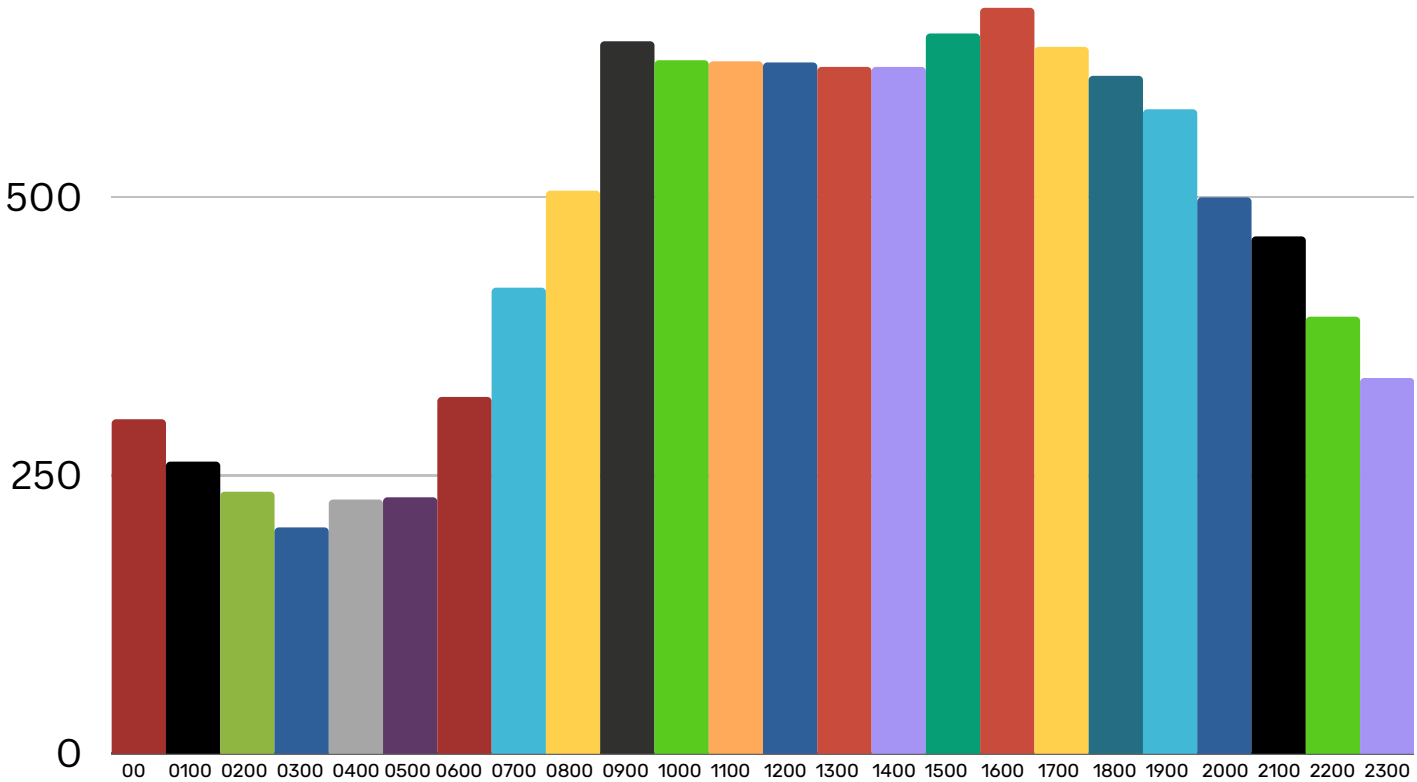

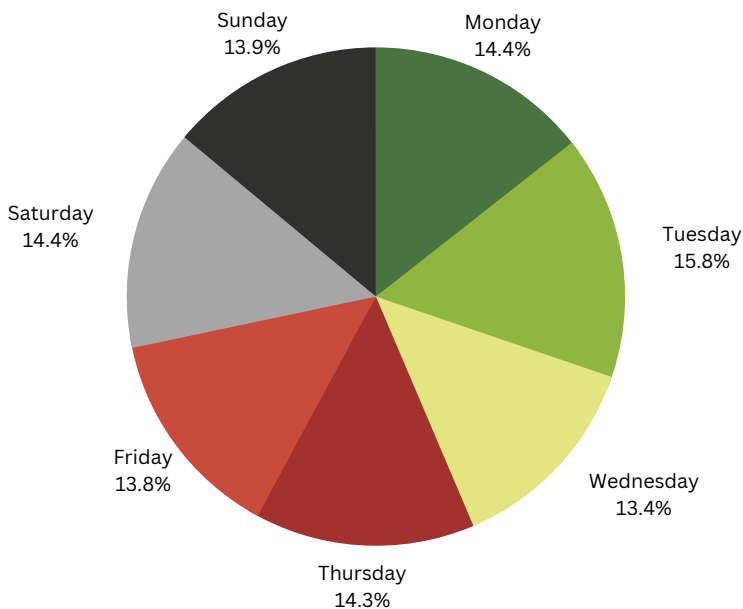


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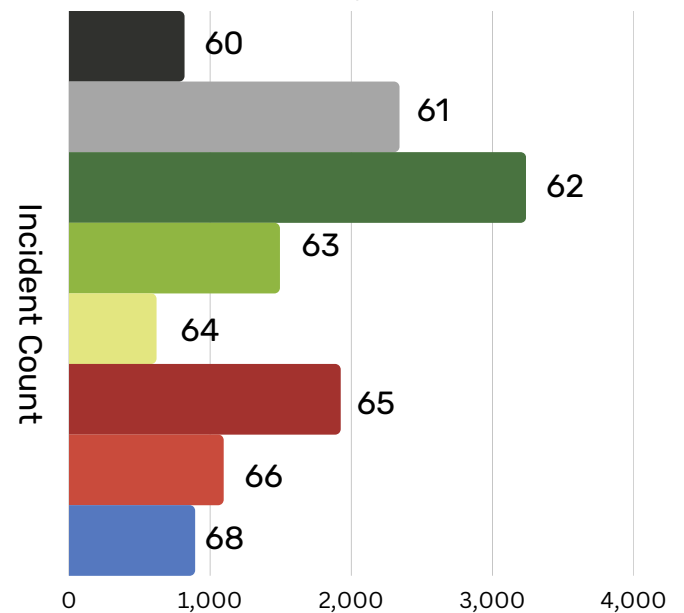
Breakdown of Calls by Hour of the Day 2022

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION



The St. George Fire Department Communications Division is located within the St. George Fire Department Headquarters Facility on Airline Highway. There are currently eighteen communications officers on staff. At least four personnel are assigned to each shift, day and night. The shifts are twelve hours in length.

East Baton Rouge EMS is the Primary 911 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for East Baton Rouge Parish. They answer the initial call and then transfer callers needing just a fire department response to the appropriate fire department. Likewise, they also transfer law enforcement calls the same way. Currently, the St. George Fire Department Communications Division dispatches all fire departments in East Baton Rouge Parish, with the exception of the Baton Rouge Fire Department.

On the Job:

The SGFD Communications Division operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. For 2022, SGFD Communications Officers, dispatched 30,062 calls, averaging 82 calls per day.

All local agencies utilize the same "Central Square" Computer Assisted Dispatch (CAD) system, which routes calls to the correct agency/dispatcher based on the incident type(s) and address entered by complaint taking personnel.



Training:

All SGFD Communications Officers have completed a basic "Public Safety Telecommunicator" (PST) course, which is provided by the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials, International (APCO). The "PST" basic training course meets and exceeds the APCO Project 33 Revised Minimum Training Standards for Public Safety Telecommunicators. APCO Project 33 training standards are widely recognized as the national industry standard for Basic Telecommunicator Training. All Fire Communications Officers have completed or will complete Firefighter 1 and Emergency Medical Responder or higher level in addition to the Public Safety Telecommunicator course.



The Property Insurance Association of Louisiana (PIAL) requires the St. George Fire Communications Officer's work to be evaluated through a Quality Assessment/Quality Improvement (QA/QI) process with feedback provided. A minimum of two hours of training are also completed each month. Part of this training includes pre-arrival instructions to callers seeking help.

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION



Tools of the Trade:

The SGFD Communications Division and all field personnel (firefighters, chiefs, fire prevention, etc.) utilize the Louisiana Wireless Information Network (LWIN) for radio communications. This is a digital 700 MHz public safety "trunked" radio system. With this system, SGFD personnel can go anywhere in Louisiana and communicate with other state agencies as well as any other agencies that utilize this system. All public safety agencies in East Baton Rouge Parish utilize LWIN. There are four simulcast sites operating in the Greater Baton Rouge area. All four sites have the same frequencies which provides a stronger signal strength in the area. These four sites are located at Lobdell Avenue (Independence Park), LSU's Tiger Stadium, EBRSO's Central Substation (Gurney Road), and Northwest Drive in Port Allen. There is a "stand alone" site at Bluebonnet Blvd. and Perkins Road which provides a significant increase in signal coverage for most (but not all) of the southern and eastern portions of our district. There is a smaller capacity site on Jackson Road, east of Zachary, which provides coverage to the northeast portion of East Baton Rouge Parish. LWIN just recently added another site in downtown Denham Springs (near the antique district), which gives us better coverage along the I-12 corridor. A 305-foot-tall communications tower with nine transmitters sits behind our headquarters facility, improving our in-building coverage in the southern and southeastern areas of East Baton Rouge Parish.

In addition to LWIN, we also utilize a VHF "simplex" radio frequency (155.0925) for station alerting. This frequency (or channel) is also on our main dispatch screen. We have 33 different station alerting/paging tones between St. George and all the other parish fire departments (excluding the Baton Rouge FD). All the other parish fire departments utilize 154.445 for their "simplex" dispatch frequency. A UHF (450-megahertz band) transmitter is utilized as a backup to the LWIN and City of Baton Rouge systems should both of those systems become inoperable and/or unavailable. The "backhaul" connection between our tower site and our headquarters building is using a 4.9 GHz microwave link. We utilize Motorola MCC-7500 Consoles and have 23 talk groups (channels) on our main dispatch screen. Two are the primary dispatch channels for St. George and all other parish departments. The remaining channels are either "fireground" channels where multi-truck incidents are handled, or important talk-groups that allow us to talk to other outside agencies (such as EMS or fire agencies from adjacent parishes).

Field personnel utilize Motorola APX 8000 portable radios and Motorola APX 8500 mobile radios and control (base) stations. All mobile and portable radios can be programmed (or re-programmed) utilizing an in-house wireless network at all St. George Fire Department facilities. There are currently over 305 different radio channels available on these radios. A color coded laminated listing of all channels is provided showing users where they are in the radio are provided in every apparatus.

MEDICAL DIVISION



When a 911 call is made, the St. George Fire Department is usually the first to arrive on scene and begin providing care to an ill or injured patient. Medical care is continued until the arrival of EMS personnel. Once EMS personnel arrive on scene, Fire Department and EMS personnel work together to deliver medical care to the patient.

The Medical Division is responsible for all medical operations within the St. George Fire Protection District. In addition to being certified as Firefighters, all operations personnel serve a dual role and are credentialed at the EMT level or above. Every apparatus in the fleet is staffed with the personnel and equipment needed to respond to a medical emergency.

Medical Division Synopsis:

The medical division is a constantly growing force here at SGFD. In 2022, we became fully staffed with 12 field personnel, 1 day staff member, and 1 chief. We have been able to purchase 3 new sprint vehicles for our medics to utilize that are currently being built.



Medical Division Review 2022:

With the addition of Paramedics and Advanced EMTs in 2021, we saw the need for more ALS units throughout the community. Because of this, we created Paramedic Engines. Engine 653 in Gardere and Engine 623 on Jefferson Highway are now staffed 24/7 with a Paramedic to enhance the quality of pre-hospital care received. Currently, we have two ALS sprint trucks and two Paramedic engines in service at all times.

Training Update:

Over the course of the year, we have implemented high-fidelity training with iSimulate monitors and Atlas manikins. We have improved our CPR training with the acquisition of "CPR Training" carts.

Our monthly medical trainings for the entire department have also been considered a success in keeping all personnel up to date on certifications and trainings in order to offer the highest quality of pre-hospital care. In addition to being able to offer training for both classes of EMTs, we look forward to being able to provide a testing site on campus in 2023 as we have recently been approved to be a Pearson Vue Testing Site.



During 2022, 26 EMTs and 16 Advanced EMTs within SGFD were trained and certified. Additionally, 31 Advanced EMTs and 37 EMTs from outside agencies gained their certifications through our partnership with the Louisiana Firefighters Foundation.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION



The St. George Fire Protection District has developed technical and heavy rescue response policies that specify the roles and responsibilities of the fire department that meet the definition of "special operations" in accordance with NFPA 1710: "Those emergency incidents to which the fire department responds that require specific and advanced training and specialized tools and equipment."

These types of incidents include, but are not limited to, structural collapse, trench collapse, rope rescue, confined space rescue, surface water rescue, swiftwater/floodwater rescue, vehicle rescue, and machinery rescue.

The SGFD has identified and established levels of functional capabilities for conducting operations at technical search and rescue incidents while minimizing threats to rescuers in accordance with the NFPA standards.



The field of rescue is constantly evolving and the rescue team works diligently to improve their skills through many hours of training. The team is always researching new and improved techniques in the world of technical rescue.

The SGFD, as the authority having jurisdiction (AHJ), has established the instructional priority and the training program content to prepare our personnel to meet the performance requirements of the NFPA standard.

The SGFD provides capabilities for these types of emergencies with 2 Squads, 1 High-Water Vehicle, 10 rescue boats, and 1 technical rescue support trailer.

The SGFD also provides capabilities in hazardous materials response with the 2 Squads and 1 support Hazmat response trailer.

Additionally, the SGFD has a Mobile Field Force, three divers on the East Baton Rouge Sheriff's Office Dive Team, and is working towards having a deployable Type 3 Incident Management Team.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS



Fire and Life Safety Education:


The St. George Firefighters save lives not just by responding to emergency calls, but by interacting with the community through education and engagement.

In 2022, the St. George Fire Protection District reached a record number of citizens in the community. Throughout the year, firefighters participated in 126 events, ranging from school visits, medical standbys, fairs, block parties, and everything in between.

Community Baby Shower:

In 2022, SGFD also partnered with the Safety Place, a local child safety and injury prevention nonprofit, to host the Ultimate Community Baby Shower at our Headquarters reaching over 300 individuals. Caregivers enjoyed educational workshops, games, prizes, community vendors, brunch, line dancing, and much more! We look forward to hosting this event again in 2023!



Santa Parades:

This past year saw a few major but beneficial changes to the long revered Santa Parades of the St. George Fire Protection District. Instead of limiting the parades to weekends, we started journeying to neighborhoods on the weeknights to ensure we did not miss anyone throughout the course of the parade. To say this was a success is an understatement as numerous neighborhoods donated more toys and canned goods than ever before!

This coming year, we look forward to enhancing our community outreach efforts and continuing to have a positive impact on our community.



FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU



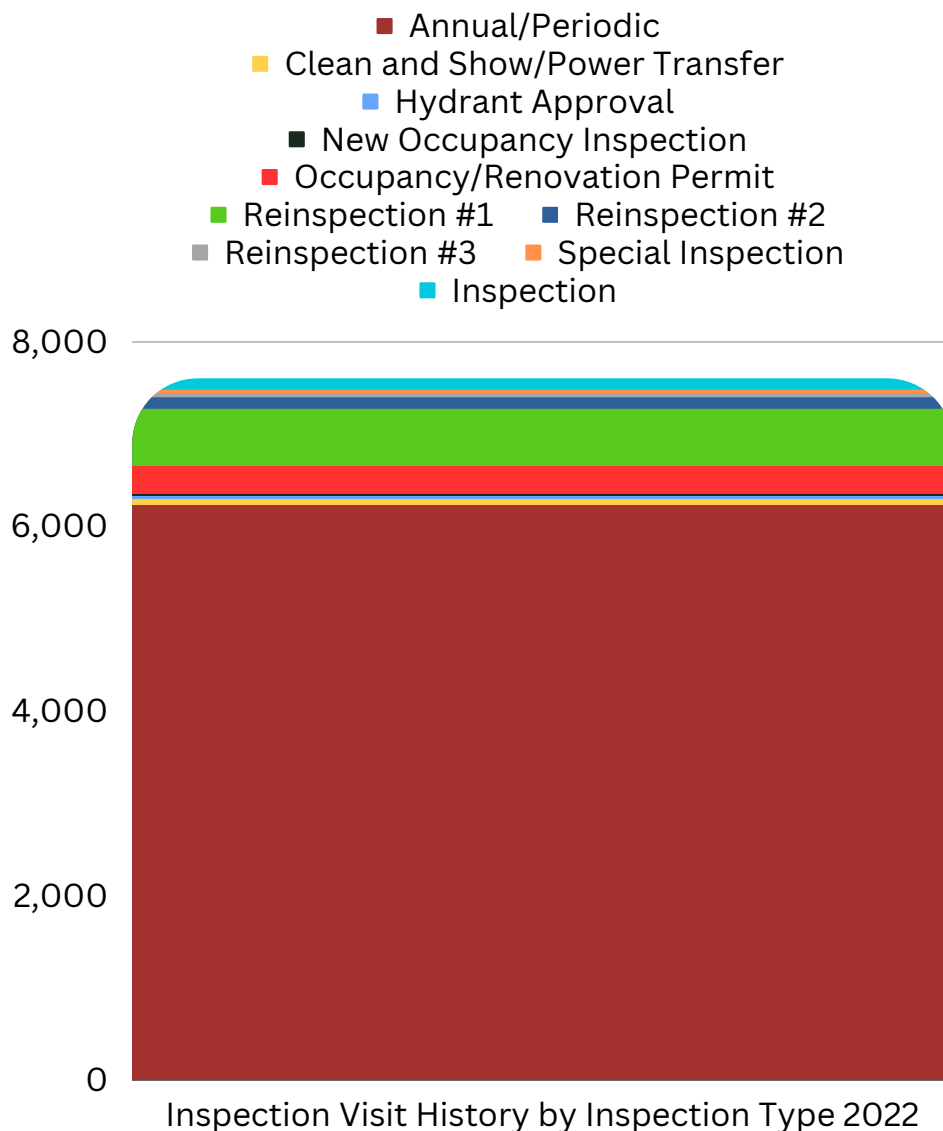
Mission of the Fire Prevention Bureau:

Our mission is to focus on life safety. The goal of the bureau is to prevent deaths and injuries from occurring through focused life safety code inspections, a broad fire education program, and a thorough examination of fire scenes upon request.

The bureau enforces all federal, state, and local laws to ensure that safety is consistently maintained throughout the jurisdiction.

Inspections 2022:

Approximately **7,700** total Fire and Life Safety Code Inspections were completed by our Fire Prevention Bureau.

SPECIAL SERVICES



Special Services Overview 2022:

The Special Services Division consists of seven personnel. This division is largely responsible for the operational and mechanical readiness of the St. George Fire Protection District. Special Services is charged with maintaining fifteen buildings, seventeen emergency apparatus, four Chief vehicles, thirteen support vehicles, and a multitude of equipment to support a modern, progressive fire department of 175 personnel.

Special Services Functions:

- Evaluate and prioritize maintenance and repair work orders
- Perform repairs to firefighting equipment, apparatus, buildings, grounds
- Annual fire pump tests
- SCBA tests
- Quarterly breathing air sample testing
- Organize and oversee third party hose testing
- Organize and oversee ground and aerial ladder testing
- Responsible for evaluating needs, gathering competitive pricing, purchasing of goods or services to meet those needs, and follow-up on actions taken
- Purchase tracking
- Maintain all maintenance records, service records, and service testing data
- Involved with the specification writing process for all new apparatus by:
 - working with manufacturers
 - overseeing the build-out
 - testing and acceptance of apparatus before delivery
- Oversee all new construction, remodels, repairs of department buildings

TRAINING DIVISION



Training Division Overview 2022:

The St. George Training Division has had a very busy but productive year. The hard work and dedication of the employees is what makes this department a beacon of training for Louisiana.

The following is a breakdown of what the men and women of SGFD completed throughout the year of 2022 in fire suppression:

All companies (Engine, Ladder, Squad, Sprints, Medic Sprints, Safety) at SGFD are required to perform a minimum of:

- 192 hours of company training
- 12 hours of officer training (officer only)
- 12 hours of driver training (firefighter/operators only)
- 6 hours of hazardous materials training
- 10 hours of community risk reduction training (officers only)
- 18 hours of drill field fire suppression related training



These hours are performed as a requirement for the Property Insurance Association of Louisiana Fire Rating Bureau. The hours that are achieved are used in the calculations for the St. George Fire Protection District #2 to maintain their Class 1 rating. These hours are achieved by company officers training in stations, in their respective districts, or at our headquarters on the drill field. The total hours of training exceeded 50,000 in just fire related training.

On the Drill Field:

We were busy on the drill field this past year covering fire suppression related skills and training suppression personnel to be ready for duty.

Skill sets covered, but not limited to, in 2022:

- Forcible entry
- Primary search
- Advancement and deployment of crews and equipment
- Rapid intervention team
- Mayday procedures and processes
- Thermal imaging camera
- Pump operations



TRAINING DIVISION



Adventures in Certifications:

SGFD personnel achieved more certifications as a department than ever before... **128** to be exact! These certifications were achieved by attendance through classroom instruction and practical completion. As a department, the first attempt pass rate was above 90%; the state average is 65%. These certifications consisted of a variety of topics:

- Fire Service Driver Operator Pumper & Aerial
- Fire Service Instructor 1 & 2
- Fire Service Inspector 1 & 2
- Fire Service Officer 1, 2, 3, & 4
- Fire Service Investigator
- Fire Service Incident Safety Officer



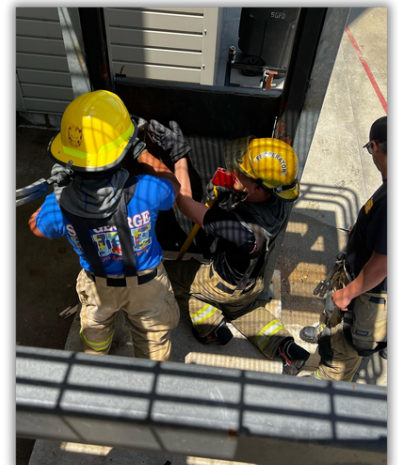
Hybrid Academy:

We also worked in conjunction with the Louisiana Firefighters Foundation (formerly the St. George Firefighters Foundation) to host the Charlie Hybrid Academy, consisting of Emergency Medical Technician and Firefighter/Operator qualifications, to create a pool of qualified candidates for hire in the Fire Service. Each candidate is required to perform at least 234 hours of EMT and 280 hours of Firefighter/Operator training to be qualified. The next academy is scheduled to finish in August of 2023.

The candidates who are offered positions at SGFD are put through a 3-week bootcamp to learn SGFD procedures and processes. This includes a very rigorous training process to have these candidates ready to ride on SGFD apparatus and serve the citizens of this district. These candidates are then handed over to the Suppression Division to be put on duty.
